August's Second Saturday will coincide with "Taste of Highland," the Highland Center's 14th annual fundraiser dinner featuring local foods. Stay after the delicious dinner on August 12 for the Elizabeth and Mary Hille Memorial Concert at 7 p.m. featuring Kate MacLeod's Mind the Gap. This concert is generously provided by the Highland County Arts Council and the Charles Pinckney Jones Foundation.

The McCoy sisters were beloved fixtures of the Highland community for nearly 90 years and the last Jones descendants to live in the iconic West Main Street home. Granddaughters of C.P. Jones and his wife Martha Jane "Mattie" Wilson Jones, Elizabeth (age 7) and Mary Hille (age 9) McCoy moved into the C.P. Jones House in 1929 with their mother Mabel Jones McCoy after their father Dr. George McCoy died unexpectedly. After graduating from Highland High School, they attended Longwood Teacher's College in Farmville and pursued careers as educators. Neither sister ever married. After a brief time away, Elizabeth returned to Highland to live with her mother in the ancestral home. Mary Hille retired in 1981 and returned to Highland and joined Elizabeth. Elizabeth passed away in 2012 at age 89, Mary Hille in 2018 at age 98.

Concert attendees can enjoy a performance by the talented Kate MacLeod from the generosity of the Charles Pinckney Jones Foundation. SingOut! Magazine states MacLeod "channels the spirit of the great Carter Family classics." She is a versatile musician adept at guitar, fiddle, mountain dulcimer and harmonica. Her songs have been featured on nationally syndicated radio shows including Tom May's "River City Folk," and were sung by others on "A Prairie Home Companion." In addition to her performing, she teaches songwriting and fiddle workshops in schools, concert outreach programs, summer camps and at music festivals. She is a sought after vocalist, fiddler and guitar player, working regularly with other artists.

This year's Taste of Highland meal will be prepared by The Warm Springs Inn using items generously donated by a variety of Highland County farmers and producers. Tickets are \$75 each or \$425 for a table of 6. Tickets are limited and must be purchased in advance at www.thehighlandcenter.org/tasteofhighland or by contacting Highland Center staff at 540-468-1922. The Highland Center executive director, Elizabeth Lohr-Myers, says "The Highland Center is very grateful to the Highland County Arts Council for allowing the McCoy Memorial Concert to coincide with and contribute to the Taste of Highland. Elizabeth and Mary Hille McCoy were deeply involved with and great supporters of both The Highland Center and the Arts Council and it is fitting that these two organizations should come together to celebrate their memory."

The concert is free, and donations will be collected to support the work of the Arts Council. Come out for a great evening of fellowship, delicious food and good music!

HCAC IN THE WILD: PLEIN AIR PAINTING

Highland County Arts Council board members Jim Sherman and Brit Chambers volunteered on July 21 with the Highland County Recreation Commission to give children the opportunity to experience plein air style painting. Through generous donations and membership fees, the arts council provided all materials for this amazing event and gave students a hands-on experience that included lots of messy fun. This collaboration between the Highland County Arts Council and the Highland County Recreation Commission is in its second year.

En plein air, or plein-air painting (plein air is French for "outdoors"), is the act of painting outdoors. Any form of painting or artistic creativity helps improve motor skills and self esteem in children. Other benefits of painting in childhood are spatial intelligence, sensory development and an increase in both concentration and patience.

The creativity of children within our community can be viewed in the display in the Mountain View Room at the Highland County Public Library.

It's been a busy season for the Arts Council! We've been hard at work securing funding such as the new educational impact grant, and hosting wonderful Arts Academy workshops.


